

# TBA AFRICAN ALUMNI GROUP: SCOPE AND STRUCTURE

#### **PURPOSE**

The TAAG has three main aims:

- \*to promote the sharing of knowledge in conservation science and practice
- \*to help identify and develop synergies within the alumni networks in Africa
- \*to be a voice for young conservationists across Africa, raising the profile of their research and helping them to shape policy.

The TAAG African student conference is the main forum for achieving these aims. The first conference was held in Nairobi, Kenya in 2013. The second conference is being held in Accra, Ghana in 2015.


### **HISTORY**

The TAAG was conceived in 2011 when a number of TBA alumni met at a TBA workshop in Amani, Tanzania. While they were there, they shared a dream of organising a conference to bring TBA African alumni together, and in doing so, to create an umbrella group to unite all TBA African alumni.

The dream came true, and the TAAG was officially launched at its first conference, held in Nairobi in 2013.

Two years on, the TAAG, now run by an elected executive, represents the growing network of national TBA alumni groups from all over Africa. Ghana plays host to a second conference in June 2015.

### **STRUCTURE**



All positions are occupied by TBA alumni representatives drawn from different regions in Africa on a voluntary basis.

The **TAAG Council of Chairs** is made up of six elected regional members (known as co-chairs). It is the decision making body of the TAAG and its main role is to guide TAAG activities and the student conferences.

The Council of Chairs members elect a **TAAG President** from among them, who coordinates TAAG Council activities. For the TAAG conference, the President works in close collaboration with the Local Organising Committee of the host country (LOC).

The **TAAG Scientific Advisory Unit** is made up of experts in different fields of biology, conservation and ecology. It is the TAAG's scientific powerhouse, whose role is to:


- Provide scientific advice to the Council of Chairs as required and especially concerning the themes of TAAG student conferences.
- Recommend plenary speakers
- Advise on which journals would be interested to publish papers presented at student conferences
- Review abstracts, papers and posters to be presented at the student conferences

The **Publicity and Communication Unit** liaises with the Council of Chairs, the Local Organising Committee and the TBA in advance of the TAAG conference. Its role is to:

- Prepare and edit TAAG communication and publicity material
- Communicate information to conference participants, speakers and other audiences of interest
- Coordinate media liaison

# Sylviane Volampeno (TBA 02/2, Kibale) - Islands States of Africa region Co-Chair

Currently, a part-time lecturer at the Animal Biology Department, Faculty of Sciences, at the University of Antananarivo, Sylviane is also a founder and president of the Madagascar conservation association "Mikajy Natiora", which

aims to protect the Malagasy endemic biodiversity by combining ecological research and local community involvement.

Sylviane holds a PhD in Zoology from the University of KwaZulu-Natal, South Africa. She is convinced that the TBA field course she attended 12 years ago in Kibale forest was a very helpful guidance for her career development. She also benefited from a TBA scholarship to support her studies in Primate Conservation at Oxford BrookesUniversity.

Sylviane attended the MTBA workshop on publishing results and fundraising in 2013, and received a TBA small grant in the same year. Her areas of interest include primate conservation, biological research, local community development and education. She has experience in lemur study project implementation, and in management and environmental education activities.

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# Hassan Shombe (TBA 94/2, Kibale) Eastern Africa region Co-chair

Shombe is an Associate Professor in the Department of Wildlife Management at the Sokoine University of Agriculture (SUA), Tanzania. He has previously worked at Tabora Beekeeping Training Institute; the Royal Netherlands Academy of Science; Njiro Wildlife Research Centre; and the College of African Wildlife Management, Mweka.

Shombe has training in ecology and wildlife management, and has immense experience in savanna fire ecology, plant-animal interactions, human-wildlife interactions and overall wildlife management issues. His background in ecology dates back to 1987, when he completed a National Diploma in Beekeeping at Tabora Beekeeping Training Institute in Tabora, Tanzania. That led to a BSc degree in Zoology and Wildlife Ecology at the University of Dar-es-Salaam (UDSM).

Shombe was a pioneer of TBA field courses, participating in the second course, in Kibale Forest in1994. He went on to gain an MSc degree in Conservation Biology (1998) at the Manchester Metropolitan University (MMU), UK. In 2007 he received a PhD from the Norwegian University of Science and Technology (NTNU), for research on the effects of fire on herbivores and their forage resources.

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## Tiwonge Ivy Gawa (TBA 05/1, Kibale) - Southern Africa region Co-chair



"I hope to strengthen links between TBA alumni in the Southern Africa region by encouraging collaborations in regional research and institution exchange visits between alumni and their students or work colleagues."

Tiwonge is a Conservation Biologist specialising in the conservation of avifauna. She currently works as the Ornithologist at the Museums of Malawi and has completed her PhD in Ecology at the University of KwaZulu Natal, South Africa. She also holds an MSc in Conservation Biology from the University of Cape Town and a BSc degree from Chancellor College, University

of Malawi.

Tiwonge is a LEAD (Leadership for Environment and Development) fellow and has also trained in various others skills such as GIS, Ecosystem Service assessments and participatory tools for Climate Change adaptation.

She is a strong believer in volunteering and currently holds a number of voluntary posts, including: Conservation &Research Officer and BirdLife Desk Officer for the Wildlife and Environmental Society of Malawi; Country coordinator (Malawi) for the African Bird Club, and country coordinator for the TBA Malawi Alumni group.

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### Jean Paul Ntungane (TBA 09/2, Amani) - Central Africa region Co-chair
